Bush Stone-curlews, many honeyeaters, Leaden Flycatcher and Spotted Pardalote are among species that nest in Atherton gardens. More specialised birds like Double-Eyed Fig-Parrot breed in rainforest remnants but regularly feed in fruiting trees, especially native figs, in the township.

Many raptors (birds of prey) hunt high over town or along creek lines. Bridled Honeyeaters and young Golden Bowerbirds are two Wet Tropics endemic birds that visit town from larger rainforest areas in winter (Dry, non-breeding season). In winter also, Sarus Cranes can be conspicuous flying low over town en route to nearby Hasties Swamp - see Bird Checklist No 10.

INFORMATION

Atherton is the centre of an important agricultural district relying mainly on basalt volcanic soils, close to the Wet Tropics World Heritage Area. A surprising range of birdlife can be seen within the Township in remnants of eucalypt woodland, rare dry "Mabi" rainforest, street trees and private gardens. Most of the rainforest is along Prior's and Mazlin Creeks and on Halloran's Hill, an extinct volcanic crater.

Halloran's Hill Conservation Park covers 25.4ha and has over 100 bird species, as well as mammals such as Red-legged Pademelon. National Park field staff have replanted degraded rainforest sections and use fire to protect the eucalypt woodland from invading weeds and rainforest.

Atherton is a medium-sized town with extensive accommodation and shopping facilities. The Halloran's Hill Conservation Park walking track (1.4km one-way) starts at the council picnic area in Maunds Rd near Prior's Creek, with tables, BBQs, playground and toilets.

The track continues up Halloran's Hill, down into the crater, then uphill again to a lookout with displays and extensive views of the Tableland and mountain ranges.
