## **INFORMATION**

Mt Surprise is a small historic railway and mining town located on the edge of the Undara Lava fields, at the gateway to north Queensland's Gulf Savannah. The region supports grazing, mining and tourism and most rainfall (776mm a year) occurs Dec-March.

Birds on this list are found in varied habitats within 5km of town - eucalypt woodland, melaleuca, vine thickets, local gardens and dams, and along creeks; plus the O'Brien's Gemfields about 40km NW of town: a hilly, rugged granite area with large boulders. Other wildlife includes many macropods (kangaroos and relatives), especially Rufous Bettongs.

Mt Surprise has a store, a hotel and a van park with units and camping. Apart from birdwatching, activities include gem fossicking, lapidary workshop, bushwalking, historical displays and the Savannahlander Outback Train. Note: in the Gulf Country facilities can be remote and visitors should be well-prepared.

171 km SW of Ravenshoe

From Ravenshoe follow the Kennedy Hway west through Mt Garnet to the 40-Mile Scrub (see BANQ Brochure No. 16). 3km past the southern Scrub boundary the Kennedy Hway diverges south (left) to The Lynd and south-west (right) to Undara, Mt Surprise, Georgetown and the Gulf. Mt Surprise is 56km from the turnoff.
